Oodi in a nutshell

- Construction cost €100 million
- Design: ALA Architects Ltd
- 10 000 visitors a day; 2.5 million a year
- 10 000 m², 3 floors
- 100 000 items in the collection
- Construction started in autumn 2015, and we opened on 5 December 2018 to celebrate Finland's centenary.
- Oodi is the Finnish Government's official centennial project.



Families dreams for Oodi

- A place for children, families and dialogue between generations
- Events for kids
- Storytime in different languages
- Space to explore, climb, crawl, jump
- Musical education, music-related events
- Reading and stories are the main purpose for libraries
- Games and playfulness
- Inspirational activities for young people

A place to hang out

- A free public space
- Peaceful and safe atmosphere
- Spending time together
- Services for families:
 - Coffee shop
 - Toilets for small kids
 - Place to heat up baby food
 - Tables for playing board games
 - Sofas
 - Group activities with third parties





Stories and reading

- Sunday evening good night storytime
- Stories in different languages
- Story room: a relaxing space to read
- No digital noise
- Children's collection: 27 000 items
- 73% out on loan
- Collection is too small





Playground Loru

- One of the library's in-house partners
- Open Mon-Fri 9.30am to 6.30 pm
- Helsinki City Department of early childhood education
- Activities for small children and their parents: rhyme time, music events, parent & baby clubs...
- Outdoor playground facilities to open in summer 2019

For daycare centres and schools


- Learning by doing (workshops)

- Emotional empowerment: experiences, joy, sense of accomplishment




Makerspace visits
